A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

What is Lent and why is it important in our lives? Once again we are entering into the season of Lent. For centuries the church has set aside the time before Easter to prepare to celebrate our most holy day. So why do we, in this post modern world, carry on a tradition which began in a time so removed from ours? Is it still relevant to our lives?

According to the PC (USA) Mission Agency, the time we spend in Lent is a transformational time for many and can impact our lives if we engage it by deliberately setting aside the time for prayer, personal sacrifice, ministry, and study. On their website the Mission Agency explains, "The season of Lent is a time of prayer, fasting and self-examination in preparation for the celebration of the resurrection of the Lord at Easter. In the early church, Lent was a time of preparation for the celebration of baptism at the Easter Vigil. In many communities of faith it remains a time to equip and nurture candidates for baptism and confirmation and to reflect deeply on the theme of baptismal discipleship."

During Lent we hear the stories of Jesus' journey to the cross, his arrest and crucifixion. It is from Jesus' death and resurrection that we recognize our need to die with Christ to the powers of death and sin and be raised with Christ to the new life he offers. "The way of the cross, the way to Easter, is through death of the "old self." In dying, we live. Through the intervention of God's gracious resurrection, lifelong changes in our values and behavior become possible. By turning from the end of the 'old self' in us, Lenten repentance makes it possible for us to affirm joyfully, "Death is no more!" and to aim toward the landscape of the new age. Faithfully adhering to the Lenten journey of "prayer, fasting and almsgiving" leads to the destination of Easter." (An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship, Geneva Press, 2003 110-111).

So how will we, at First Presbyterian Church in Rolla "faithfully adhere to the Lenten journey of 'prayer, fasting, and almsgiving?'?" Of course we will be worshipping together throughout the season and also include special services to mark our journey.

MOVING FORWARD

On February 24, I made an announcement on behalf of Session, and as chair of the Way Forward committee. At the leadership retreat on January 29, attended by most of the session, deacons, and trustees, we decided to pursue a few changes to our church building. Katie and Lou Ellen made some contacts regarding changes to the office, Sadler Lounge, and nursery, which the Session discussed and approved at its meeting on February 18. On the 24th, I also hosted a conversation in the chapel. For the benefit of those who missed the chapel meeting, or who may have forgotten some of what was said, here's a few questions and answers.

What are we changing, and what are we leaving the same?

The nursery will be in the room that Katie currently sits in. The existing pastor's study will be converted to a meeting room. Katie will sit in the foyer; the existing counter will be replaced by a normal desk. The Sadler Lounge will be converted to the pastor's study. The library will stay where it is, and the copier and safe will be moved into it.

For the time being, the existing copy room will be storage. The Sadler Chapel will <u>not</u> be impacted in any way.

Why are we doing this?

The primary reason is to move the nursery to be close to the sanctuary. Right now, the nursery is at literally the furthest possible point from the sanctuary. With the changes, the nursery will be almost as close as possible. This is an essential way to show hospitality to our visitors with children.

The secondary reason is to make the office accessible. Right now, it is physically impossible for people in a wheelchair to reach the office, and challenging for many others in the congregation and drop-in visitors. As a result, office staff regularly needs to come down to the foyer to meet people. With the change, both Katie and Lou Ellen will be right by the portico door, which is accessible. As an added benefit, security will be improved because Katie will be able to monitor those who come and go.

If Katie's office is out in the foyer, how will that be secure?

Katie will have a laptop instead of a desktop computer. She will keep it in a locked drawer, and will similarly store all papers, etc.

How much will this cost?

Based on preliminary discussions with various contractors, the cost is expected to be less than \$4000, the maximum amount approved by Session. This will include plumbing, electrical work, new furniture for Katie, and some people to move stuff.

Plumbing? Will the nursery have a bathroom?

Plan A is to revive the old bathroom in the pastor's study. IF the sewer line is OK, this should be an inexpensive project. However, if it is NOT, then the cost will be excessive.

In that case, we will fall back to plan B: the sanctuary restroom. There are some logistical issues with that, but we believe they will be manageable for the foreseeable future. Parents will be asked to change their own kids' diapers, and potentially to take their own kids to the restroom.

Why not move the library to the new meeting room?

The shelves are built into the walls. At this time, the effort required and the benefit expected do not justify moving the library. The library will be accessible without entering the pastor's office, via the door that opens out onto the stairway.

What are the restrictions on the Sadler Lounge and trust?

At this time, the clerk of session is officially the trustee, who shall act only with the advice and consent of the session. There is no longer an outside trustee. Therefore, we may use the money available to ensure the continued attractive appearance and utility of the chapel and lounge in a way that serves the congregation.

Is there going to be a capital campaign?

Given the low cost of the move, we decided not to do a campaign at this time. There is more on the horizon. The building as a whole has many issues that need to be addressed. There will likely be a capital campaign in the near future, so we did not want to ask twice.

How does this solve our accessibility problem?

Well, it doesn't solve it, but does improve it. Right now, the nursery is not accessible; with the change, it won't meet ADA guidelines, but will be much closer with far fewer stairs. Right now, the office is not accessible; with the change, it will be. There is lots more we can and should do. This project was chosen as a relatively easy, relatively inexpensive change that can have a significant impact.

I still have questions. Who should I ask, or what should I do?

After worship on March 3, I will again be available in the chapel. In addition, feel free to speak with Lou Ellen, any elder on Session, or anyone on the Way Forward Committee.
